Undergraduate Course Descriptions

Biblical Studies (BIBL)

BIBL 101 – Introduction to the Old Testament (3 credits)

Survey of the Old Testament with emphasis on historical background, covenant themes, and theological significance.

BIBL 102 – Introduction to the New Testament (3 credits)

Overview of the New Testament, highlighting the life of Christ, the apostolic church, and core theological concepts.

BIBL 110 – Hermeneutics: Principles of Biblical Interpretation (3 credits)

Introduces methods of interpretation, emphasizing context, genre, and application for teaching and preaching.

BIBL 120 – Life and Teachings of Jesus (3 credits)

Examines the words and works of Jesus Christ as presented in the Gospels, with focus on discipleship.

BIBL 130 – Acts and the Early Church (3 credits)

Explores the Book of Acts and the development of the early church under the power of the Holy Spirit.

BIBL 150 – Pentateuch (3 credits)

Study of Genesis through Deuteronomy, focusing on creation, covenant, and God's redemptive plan.

BIBL 210 – Old Testament Survey II (3 credits)

Continues Old Testament study, emphasizing prophetic and wisdom literature in historical and theological context.

BIBL 220 - New Testament Survey II (3 credits)

BIBL 240 – Life and Letters of Paul (3 credits)

BIBL 310 – Pentateuch Studies (3 credits)

THEO 101 – Introduction to Christian Doctrine (3 credits)

THEO 201 – Systematic Theology I (3 credits)

Examines the doctrines of God, Christ, and the Holy Spirit with emphasis on biblical foundations and theological clarity.

THEO 202 – Systematic Theology II (3 credits)

Covers the doctrines of salvation, the Church, and eschatology, exploring their relevance to Christian faith and practice.

THEO 210 – Historical Theology (3 credits)

Traces the development of Christian doctrine from the early Church to the modern era.

THEO 220 – Contemporary Theological Issues (3 credits)

Engages with modern and postmodern theological challenges, including secularism, pluralism, and interfaith dialogue.

THEO 310 – Doctrine of God and Christ (3 credits)

Coursework includes advanced seminars, leadership development, applied research, and a doctoral project.

DMIN 701 – Biblical Foundations for Ministry Renewal (3 credits)

Academic Policies

Grading System and GPA Standards

HTICU uses a standard 4.0 grading scale for all undergraduate, graduate, and doctoral programs.

- A = 90–100% = 4.0 (Excellent)
- B = 80–89% = 3.0 (Good)
- C = 70–79% = 2.0 (Satisfactory)
- D = 60–69% = 1.0 (Poor)
- F = Below 60% = 0.0 (Failure)

GPA Requirements

- Undergraduate students must maintain a minimum GPA of 2.0 to remain in good academic standing.
- Graduate and Doctoral students must maintain a minimum GPA of 3.0 to remain in good academic standing.

Academic Probation

Students who fall below the required GPA standard will be placed on **academic probation** for one term. If the student does not improve their GPA to the required minimum during the probationary period, they may face suspension or dismissal from the program.

Graduation Requirements

- Certificates: 20–25 credit hours
- Associate Degrees: 45 credit hours
- Bachelor's Degrees: 90 credit hours (includes general education, biblical/theological core, and concentration courses)
- Master's Degrees: 30–40 credit hours beyond the bachelor's degree
